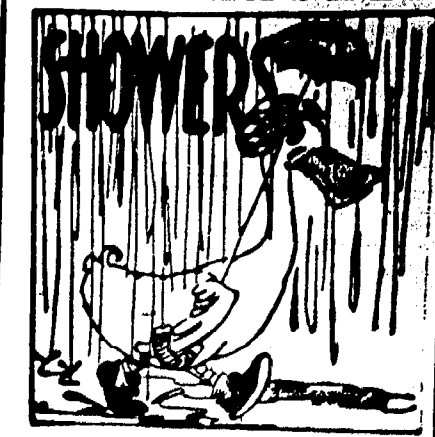

HECKMAN AND BLAIR FOUR VOTES APART

When the official count of Tuesday's primary vote began at noon Friday just four votes separated Joseph Blair and William Heckman for the second Democratic nomination for county commissioner.

Discovery was made late Thursday that an error had been made in reporting that morning over the telephone the unofficial vote in the Yatesboro district of Cowanshock township.

Later in the day, however, further word came correcting the first report. The correct vote of Mr. Blair and Mr. Heckman at Yatesboro was found to be Blair 9 and Heckman 5, giving Blair 4 more votes than Heckman and the unofficial totals stood at that margin when the official count began Friday at noon.

(By United Press) Paris, Sept. 19.—Without any ceremony, Bulgaria was today handed the peace treaty in the French foreign office. The Bulgarian government was given 25 days for a reply. The treaty was presented in the presence of a single representative of each of the Allied countries and ten newspaper correspondents.
